God, Jesus, Holy Spirit Or



Tithes and offerings are wonderful ways to show the primacy of God (God is first in our lives), and to return some of the gifts we received to support the spread of the Gospel (the fact that Jesus Christ died for our sins and to give us eternal life). Giving to the church is often a contentious and difficult topic for discussion within the body of believers in Jesus Christ. The human desire to accumulate and hold as much money as possible renders money a "mammon" or god in our lives. In addition, past frequent pleas for money and abuses of money by ministers and/or congregations have resulted in reluctant givers. With our cultural bias to hoard money and a strong skepticism towards giving to the church, how should we give financially to support God's work? The above scriptures address the topic of giving in a clear manner. Below are questions with scriptural references that should assist a believer in gaining comfort on how to appropriately give back to God. Giving will be more meaningful and effective if it is done based on Scripture and the lead of the Holy Spirit.

1. Should I give a tithe (a tenth of my earnings) and an offering (any giving above a tenth of my earnings)? Yes. See Malachi 3: 8 and Genesis 28: 20 - 22.
2. Does my salvation depend on my giving? No. See Romans 10: 9 - 10.
3. Should I give because I feel compelled to give? No. See II Corinthians 9: 7.
4. Am I cursed if I do not give a tithe based on Malachi 3: 9? No. See Galatians 3: 13 -14.
5. Does God care about our giving? Yes. See II Corinthians 9: 7 ("God loves a cheerful giver.")
6. Does my attitude matter? Yes. God wants us to cheerfully give. See passage above.
7. Does my giving matter for me? Yes. God loves a cheerful giver (II Corinthians 9), opens the windows of heaven (Malachi 3: 10), and rebukes the devour (Malachi 3: 11). See pg. 7

"Praise and worship is a lifestyle based on a personal relationship with the Lord. It's not about *See next page*

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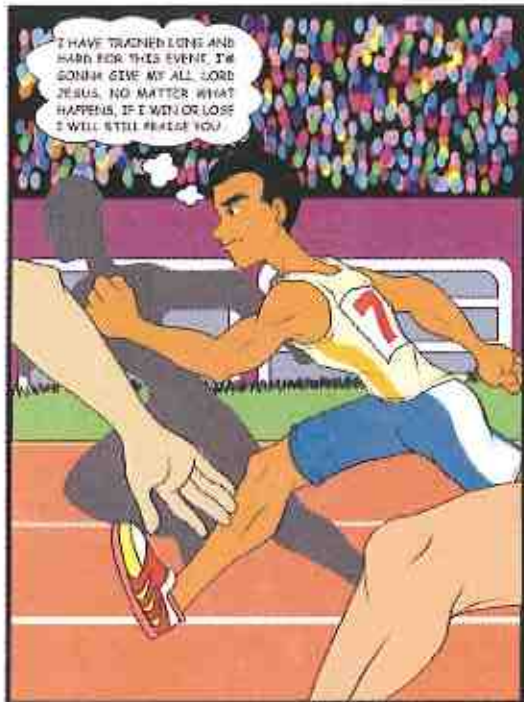

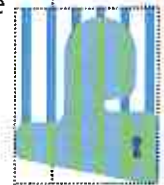

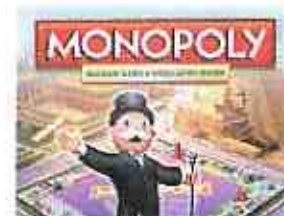

Ideal Weight or Happy Weight?

Maybe you've been struggling -- without success -- to get down to the size you were in high school or on your wedding day. But do you really need to go that low? The truth, experts say, is that you can weigh more than your ideal weight and still be healthy (not to mention happy). If you're overweight, losing just 10% of your body weight is associated with a myriad of health benefits, including lowering blood pressure, blood cholesterol, and blood sugar, and reducing your risk for heart disease. Not only that, experts say, but this kind of weight loss is easier to attain and maintain, setting you up for success in the long run.

Your Weight "Set Point" Just as your body temperature is programmed to stay around 98.6 degrees, your body weight is naturally regulated to stay within a range of 10%-20%, says Thomas Wadden, PhD, director of the Center for Weight and Eating Disorders at University of Pennsylvania Medical School. This weight range is known as the "set point." It is not just a matter of genetics, though. Your eating and exercise habits can also help to determine your set point.

"Overeating swamps the internal regulatory system, and, as a result, the set point increases -- which is much easier to do than it is to lower it," says Wadden. The body adjusts to the higher weight and "resets" the set point to defend the new weight.

The 10% Solution to Weight Loss When you lose large amounts of weight at once, you set up an internal struggle and hormones like ghrelin spike to make you hungrier as your body tries to defend its comfortable range.

Instead, experts recommend that you try losing 10% the old-fashioned way -- by slowly changing eating and exercise behaviors -- then maintain this new weight for a few months before trying to lose more. Not only will your body get the signal to lower its "set point," but you'll give yourself a chance to get used to new food choices, smaller portions, and regular exercise.

How Much Should I Weigh? Most people overestimate how much weight they can realistically lose, which leads to frustration, says Blatner. To find your happy or healthy weight, Blatner suggests looking back on your weight history as an adult and identify a weight you were able to maintain naturally and fairly easily.

Instead of focusing on the numbers on the scale, Blatner suggests setting behavioral goals: "Eat breakfast every day, go for daily walks, eat more fruits and vegetables -- when you set behavior goals, they are easier to accomplish and they make you feel good." Stick with these behaviors for 3-6 months and they will become part of your life.

Tips for Weight Loss Success Here are some tips from Blatner for weight loss success:

1. Eat regular meals. People who eat regular meals consume fewer calories than those who eat irregular meals.
2. Use a plate, sit down, and enjoy your meals. Folks who do this eat 43% smaller portions than those who eat out of containers or on the run, according to Blatner.
3. Get at least 30 minutes of moderate activity each day.
4. How much and what you eat makes a big difference. Enjoy normal portions of foods that are high in fiber (fruits, veggies, whole grains) and rich in lean or low fat protein is the secret to feeling full.
5. Think positive: Focus on the benefits of a healthier lifestyle rather than the scale.

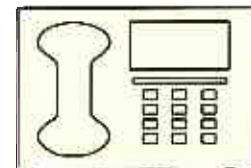

Commentary From One of Our Students

February is marked as Black History Month, children and students from Head Start up to High school will learn about some of the important and notable prominent African-American leaders. While I was in grade school, every February we would have school assemblies with all grade levels to perform, do research, and inform the school on an historic black leader. As a young African-American female I am still learning more information about my culture. Growing up I figure out that Martin Luther King, Rosa Parks, George Washington Carver, Harriet Tubman were not only that made a difference in Black History.

I learned many new things while I was conducting my own research, on African American Culture and History to learn about where I came from. While conducting my research I learned that there were two parts of The Civil Rights Movement, the different parts of African American history, and the various people that had an effect on history. Being an African American female in today's world, I am apart of many different aspects of history. This past November I voted for the first time in a Presidential election, and I felt that I made history because I made a difference and voted for the person I wanted to win. Little Known Black History Fact

Irene Reid 1930-2008—A jazz vocalist whose style was heavily laced with ele-

ments of gospel and the blues, never achieved as much success as contemporaries like Dinah Washington and Esther Phillips who took a similar approach. But she worked steadily, and she finished her life on a high note with a surprising career resurgence. Born in Savannah, Ga., on Sept. 23, 1930, Ms. Reid began singing in a church choir. Her voice easily stood over everyone else. She left her home and moved to New York in 1947 to pursue a singing career. After winning the Apollo Theater's amateur contest several times, she spent two years with the Dick Vance band at the Savoy Ballroom in Harlem before going out on her own.

She joined the infamous Count Basie band in 1961 and stayed for a year, then formed her own small group, Irene Reid and Company, and recorded two big-band albums for Verve, one of the leading jazz labels of the period. But probably her most prominent job in the post-Basie years was on Broadway, where she briefly joined the cast of "The Wiz" as the wicked witch Evillene, the role originated by Mabel King.

In 1997, after two decades spent largely under the show-business radar, Ms. Reid began recording for the small Savant label with the organist Charles Earland. Her album "Million Dollar Secret" was the first of six she released as a leader in her last years — more than she had in her entire career up to that time. She also worked frequently at Smoke, the Lenox Lounge and other New York nightclubs until a few years ago, when health problems forced her to stop performing. We salute the life and legacy of another great African-American. Her husband, James Reid Sr., preceded her in death, her legacy continues in her five children, Michael and Bernard Redfield and James, Gregory and Gwendolyn Reid.
